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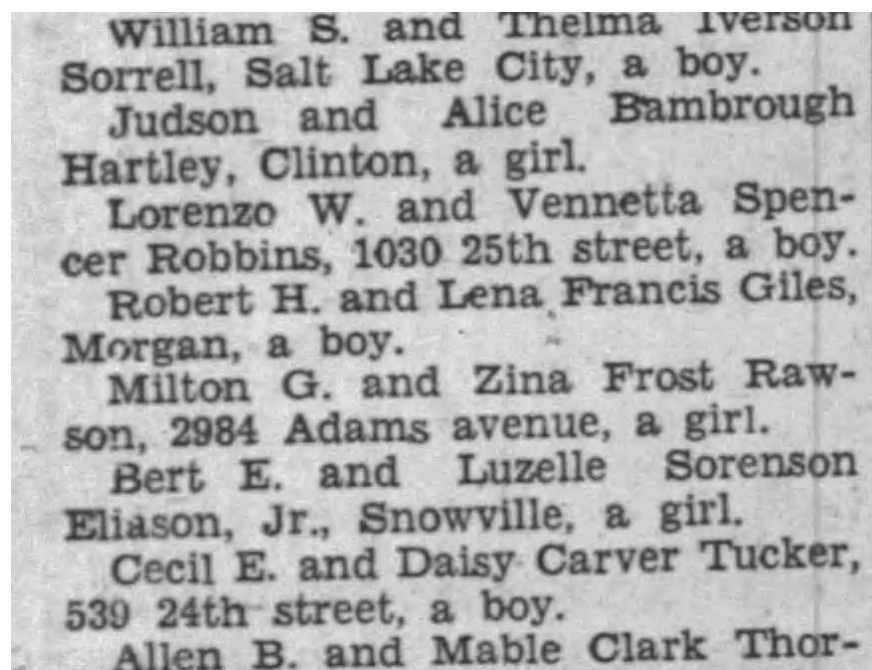

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Three Outfits Seek Titles

SEATTLE, March 1 (AP)—Three teams remained in the running today for the Pacific coast conference's northern division basketball title.

As the circuit enters its final week, the defending champion Oregon State Beavers hold a game and one-half margin. Washington State and Washington are deadlocked for second.

Oregon state clinched at least a tie for the title by twice striking down the Washington State Cougars in weekend games. But the Beavers who have lost two or three games with Oregon this season, meet the Ducks in a single tilt on the Oregon floor Saturday night.

Washington State opens a two-game set with Oregon in Eugene tonight. Washington has a pair billed with Idaho in Seattle this weekend.

An Oregon State triumph over Oregon would clinch the title regardless of the outcome of the other series. An Oregon win, however, would (1) bring a two-way deadlock if W.S.C. sweeps its Oregon frays or Washington its Idaho set, or (2) a three-way tie if both Washington and Washington State mark up double victories.

A loss of either Washington or Washington State would eliminate that club from further consideration.

Oregon State moved into its title-topping position Saturday with a 58-52 win over Washington State. The Beavers, defending coast champions, finished with a 53-43 victory over the Cougars.

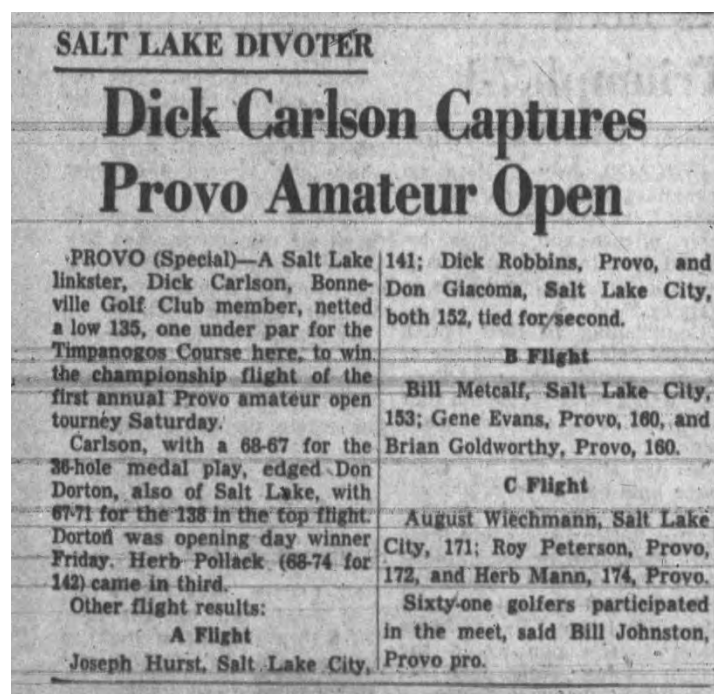
