





Student Opinions Brought Forth During November 12 Assembly

The Weber campus today appears to be in a turmoil as the result of Tuesday's Nov. 12, program in the semi-weekly assembly series. The program, sponsored by a group of veterans interested in the college and opportunities given them in college, developed during the last few minutes into a wild debate on the merits of the SIGNPOST and the policies pursued by it.

The assembly opened with a round-table discussion of four overseas veterans and the moderator Douglas Moore on the problems of the veterans in their adjustment to college life and their ideas on the current plan of veteran legislation. John Murphy opened the discussion with a brief narration on his personal ideas of veteran problems.

G.I. Bill Explained - Mr. Murphy was followed by McPhie, who voiced the procedure and details of the rehabilitation program, and Grant Maw, who explained briefly the G.I. Bill of Rights. The closing speaker, **Bud Robbins**, gave a detailed approach to the various veteran plans offered by the states, and suggested the organization of a group of Utah college students and veterans to push adequate veteran legistion through Utah's legislature.

Sparks began to fly when the program was thrown open to an audience discussion of veteran's gripes. Laurence Burton fired the opening shot with his opinion that the SIGNPOST was offering only negative criticism of Weber's problems in the publication of anonymous letters such as the Irishman's letter in the Nov. 8 edition and such negative criticism was serving no useful place in the constructive efforts to eliminate Weber's problems.

Signpost Speaks - Mr. Burton was answered by Howard E. Wright, associate editor of the SIGNPOST, who implied that the paper did not attempt to interpret student opinion except in its editorial columns, and that the Letters to the Editor department was open to any student.0t opinion regardless of its nature.

Mr. Wright explained that the by-lined features appearing in the Signpost did not necessarily reflect the views of the paper, but they are the views of the named writer.

Blake Storey, student body business manager, summarized the complaints of Mr. Burton and Mr. Wright by suggesting that a great number of students have much criticism to offer but never offer any cooperation in the student activities, and if these persons would cooperate the SIGNPOST would not have quite so much to talk about. Mr. Storey also talked about Weber's social clubs and the roles they played in the student activities, and he suggested that any Weber student could become a member of a social club. He said the idea of cliques in these clubs which had been stated to be carryovers from Ogden high school was entirely in the imagination of the minority groups.

The general consensus of opinion on the campus is that the SIGNPOST has offered much criticism but that it is playing an unestimable part in bolstering the spirit by causing such spirited discussions.

Slope Dope by Tom Mathews

For about 500 students at the University of Utah the terms B.A. and B.S. have taken on new meaning - Bachelor of Arlberg and Bachelor of Sitzmark. Both degrees are now being awarded by the school in addition to the lesser degrees in things like electronics, chemistry, Greek and medicine. You can win this sheep-skin in just one quarter, although the B.A. often takes longer. Anybody, even a wooden-legged blind man, can get a B.S. It's as easy as falling off a rope tow. The dean of this school is Dr. N.P. Neilson, who along with Ike Armstrong, Utah athletic director and football coach, started scholastic skiing four years ago. Dr. Neilson's righthand man is a woman, Alice Bronson, a very nice person who looks equally at home with tea cup or christie.

Real Veteran - Acting as administrators of the ski school, these two enjoy the services of a cohort who was born in a snowbank and who wore downhill pants before diapers. He is Fredl Lang, anthropology teacher now turned skimeister. He teaches anthropology, whatever that is, once in a while. Under this upper crust of bosses come the instructors whose job it is to convey to the students the art of coming down a hill with six or seven feet of timber on their feet. On Saturdays four beginning, three elementary, two intermediate and two advanced classes are held. The buses travel to Alta, Brighton and Little mountain or to Fort Douglas if the weather is bad. In all the classes held only half a dozen unfortunates have injured themselves, a fine safety record. The excellence of that record is a payoff on the University of Utah's objective in teaching the sport. They aim at controlled skiing by progress from the simple to difficult maneuvers. They also are accomplishing another great objective - teaching people how to have fun.





Evaporated Milk Production in Utah Marks 50th Year

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of evaporated milk production in Utah. The now thriving industry was born in Richmond, utah, with the opening there of a Sego Milk Products Company plant in 1904. The "Logan Herald" on March 10, 1904 reported: "Condensed Milk Factory at Richmond is Now in Operation."

"Monday, March 14, saw the Utah Condensed Milk Factory in full operation and by night, 2000 pounds of condensed milk was ready for shipment. The commencement was very satisfactory to those in charge. Everything went off in perfect order. There was not a hitch in any part of the machinery and the product put out was said to be of the very best quality."

That the first day started so auspiciously is a tribute to the founders of the first plant: Marriner W. Merrill, J.W. Hendricks, Brigham Pond, H.B. Rackliff, Andrew L. Hyer, Charles Z. Harris, Thomas H. Merrill, and many others.

In 1903 it became apparent that dairying, as a major Cache Valley industry, would have to be abandoned unless outside markets were obtained. Butter and cheese not only returned low prices but lacked expanding sales. A new commodity, evaporated milk, offered opportunities. An investigation in the East was made by C.E. Merrill, C.Z. Harris, and H.B. Rackliff. Upon receiving a favorable report on the venture, committees were formed to sell stock for the "Utah Condensed Milk Company." A \$100,000 goal was set.

Enthusiasm for the new project ran high at the outset, and \$60,000 in funds was soon promised. Then rumors of evaporated milk failures in other areas were reported. Discouragement arose. Finally a mass meeting was held at Richmond to settle the matter. Marriner W. Merrill, a Mormon Apostle, in a few well-chosen words, spurned difficulties. Then he proposed starting construction on the following day. Unanimous approval was given and the chief industry of Cache Valley was started.

Since the first plant f the Utah Condensed Milk Company, later changed to the Sego Milk Products Company, was erected, millions of dollars have been returned to the people of Cache Valley in milk and cream checks and wages. The original plant has been and still is a substantial factor in the development of the dairy industry in this region. Surely the vision and determination of our pioneers in this project has resulted in manifold benefits to their posterity.

The "condenser" as it was commonly called, was a success from the beginning.

Father to Son: These first employes assisted in starting an industry which has meant a steady market for Cache Valley milk for fifty years. They also established an industry which provided steady employment for their posterity. Today many relatives of the first group of Richmond condensery employers are employed at Sego Milk Products Company's Richmond plant.

On Oct 6, 1937, the theatre was opened for business and shows were presented for the first time and **Albiston** was there on opening night. 


