"Womanho Call," Miss Ellen Wallace read the report of cells filled by the Hechive Girls. "Talk-Spirit of the Hive" was the subject of an address by Miss Ann M. Cannon, while Mrs. Emily Adams conducted a discussion on 'Builders' Purpose' among builders of the hive. President Martha H. Tingey of the M. I. A. gave an address, "My Beethive Girls," Benefiction was by Miss Charlotte Stewart.

To win the award of a bracelot the girls had to build forty-five cells—the cells being the unit of varlous forms of work in the society. Those things that must be performed, each counting for a cell, were sleeping out of doors for two months, standing correctly, set a table tastefully and mend their own clothes for two months. The work is divided into different fields—health, public service, business, out of door exercise, religion and domestic arts. One of the requirements is to go two months without catching cold.

# NURSES URGED TO ANSWER CALL FOR U. S. DUTY

Shortage Is Claimed the Weakest Link In Defense

The recent disaster drill in Ogden conducted by the local Red
Cross chapter is said to have revealed that mobilization of nurses
for emergencies is the weakest link
in the county's preparedness chain,
"Although the Red Cross operates training classes in Ogden for
practical nursing and the Thomas
D. Dee Memorial hospital has a
large graduating class of trained
nurses every year, it seems that
more are needed immediately" said
L Wesley Robbins, vice chairman
of Weber county chapter, American
Red Cross.
Ogden is not alone in its dearth

Ogden is not alone in its dearth of women able to assist in giving aid to the sick and injured. The Red Cross, which supplies nurses for the army nurse corps, is casting around for more and more "angels of mercy," he said.

More than 10,000 of America's nurses will be serving with the army or navy within the next year, Miss Mary Beard, national director of the Red Cross nursing service, has predicted. The authorized total of the army nurse corps alone for the 1942 fiscal year is 8,237, she pointed out.

Miss Beard requests all qualified registered nurses to enroll immediately in the Red Cross first reserve of nurses. This reserve, which furnishes the army and navy nurse corps with competent personnel and is the source for nurses needed in Red Cross disaster relief work, now totals 24,000 nurses, but that is not enough, the service states.

"As a result of the national defense program," Miss Beard said, "there is an acute need for more women and girls to take up nursing as a career. To help meet this need the American Red Cross his summer is sponsoring the Red Cross nurses' training camp at Bryn Mawr college, where 200 women college graduates will be trained in a shorter time than the usual 36 months.

"I cannot urge too strongly that all young women give immediate and careful thought to the possibility of entering nursing schools this year. Various steps are being taken to increase the student body capacity of these schools."

In Ogden, the Thomas D. Dee Memorial hospital and Weber college collaborate on the training of nurses. Courses in home hygiene and care of the sick are offered under Red Cross sponsorship to make practical nursing a more general accomplishment. First aid courses, too, are offered at many places in the city.

Girls and women who wish to take sdvantage of one or more of these training programs may obtain complete details as to classes at the Red Cross office on the ground floor of the City-County building and at the office of the supervisor of nurses at the Dee hospital.





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# Red Cross Disaster Group Rallies For Emergencies

explosions at Pearl Harbor had hardly died away when the disaster committee of Weber county chapter American Red Cross, was called into special meeting.

At the behest of Chairman E. G. Bennett and Vice Chairman L. Wesley Robbins of the chapter, Cochairmen A. T. Bar-rett and C. E. Armstrong summoned the disaster group to meeting at noon of Dec. 8, less than 24 hours after the first flash had been received here telling of the Japanese attack.

Almost at once, the committee began fearlessly looking itself over for weaknesses. And it found them.

#### Twenty First Aiders

The rescue unit reported that while it had 104 trained first aiders listed on its rolls, theoretically available in an emergency in actuality only about 20 of the group would be available in case of disaster or bombing because the others were occupational specialists who would be needed on their own jobs during such a time.

It also reported a shortage of emergency equipment—blankets, stretchers, bandages, splints—all the items that would be needed to administer first aid to a bombed community.

The transportation committee reported insufficient ambulances available and none of the equipment with which stake trucks could be converted into emergency ambulances. Other weak-nesses were boldly ferreted out.

#### Hundreds In Training

Today, exactly two months later, through activity precipi-tated at that meeting, 2500 men and women are trained or in training as first aid workers,

Echoes of gunfire and bomb † using the standard and advanced Red Cross courses in the subject. Kent S. Bramwell, appointed director of first aid training, has had as many as 75 classes in session over a week's period. This work will relieve the situation as to emergency first aid crews, but has caused a new problem. There are so many persons now seeking instruction in first aid work that instructors cannot be provided for all of them. However, by long-time planning of courses, this problem is expected to work itself

> The establishment here of a Red Cross processing plant to supply the west coast with articles produced by the chapters west of the Mississippi offered a contact with national headquarters unavailable previously, and now plans are under way to have emergency units for the rescue division available at the Red Cross depot. Requested are units for transforming trucks into ambulances, splints, and blankets, particularly necessary in the event of a gas attack.

#### Nurse Shortage

Other units of the disaster group reported themselves well organized except for the medical aid department, which said there was a severe shortage of nurses. To obviate this need, at least partially, one class of nurses' aides has been trained and another is to begin this month.

# **Welfare Service**

The emergency welfare service includes those types of services and assistance provided to meet the varied social and economic needs of civilians which result from enemy action. Such needs include not only emergency food and housing for those who are rendered homeless by attack, but also those social services necessary to reestablish families and get workers back to their jobs as quickly as possible.

A special order transferred this week from the wardens service to a special service of its own, the emergency welfare service.

The responsibilities of the service include information and registration, temporary rest shelters where food is distributed and other forms of emergency aid should be immediately available; provisions for rehousing families; cash assistance to those who have lost all immediate resources; removal and storage of furniture and other effects from damaged buildings; minor repairs for homes, and the replacement of tools and other working materials to return workers to productive status.

The Red Cross committees on food, housing, clothing, registration and information are all parts of this service. They operate on the basis of mass care. When the welfare and social work gets on an individual basis, then an additional welfare committee takes over the work.

The Savich slaying, which makes Ogden's seventh case of homicide to go on record within a period of 30 days, came as a reality of quarrel between Erz and Savich. According to witnesses, Erz fired the fatal shot from a 30 caliber Luger automatic platol in
